

Your Commitment Ceremony with a Celebrant

A commitment ceremony allows you complete freedom of choice.

It is your ceremony. You are the reason for and the focus of the ceremony. You choose the celebrant, the date, the time, the place, the words, the music and how you wish the ceremony to be conducted.

The ceremony can be as long you want. If you have guests, we advise having a ceremony which is not too short. You can include any poems, personal journey stories, readings, music, rituals, or cultural symbols.


Family and friends may participate meaningfully in the ceremony. Planning and rehearsal are essential for success, and working closely with your celebrant will ensure that all participants know their role and act accordingly.

The venue for the ceremony is limited only by your imagination – reception centre, restaurant, hotel, heritage buildings, beach, golf club, bowls club, home, garden, park, and former church buildings are available.

The place may have a special significance to you. If you have chosen an outside venue, please select an alternative in case of inclement weather.

No two celebrants are the same and our Professional Celebrants have a commitment to high standards. You need to feel relaxed and confident that your celebrant will carry out your wishes and give you the best advice.

Creating Your Commitment Ceremony

Finding the Right Celebrant



10 Point Quality Ceremony

- ① You are supplied with the source book *Ceremonies and Celebrations* or equivalent on loan.
- ② You are given complete choice of ceremony. At a relaxed interview with the celebrant, you can discuss all your ceremony requirements.
- ③ You are entitled to unlimited consultation by phone or in person with the celebrant.
- ④ You are entitled to an on-site rehearsal, or if this is not possible, at a suitable place (within a reasonable distance).
- ⑤ You are provided with a copy of your ceremony created in conjunction with you.
- ⑥ Your commitment certificate is calligraphied or laser printed.
- ⑦ Appreciation certificates are provided for other ceremony participants on request.
- ⑧ Ample time is allowed with the knowledge that no other ceremony will be booked so close that the celebrant arrives late or rushes out in an unseemly manner.
- ⑨ You have the personal commitment that the celebrant will do his/her best to become familiar with the ceremony beforehand, and will read his/her part in a sincere, intelligent and fully audible manner.
- ⑩ As far as possible, the celebrant will dress to fit in with your ceremony.


